Local Geography

Cedar Lake (2) dominates the local geography of Nashua, serving as a hub of community activity as well as a tourist attraction. The Cedar River (26) flows south from the lake, connecting Nashua to Plainfield. Residents are able to access the river from a small boat launch (21), from which they go tubing down the river to the park in Plainfield.

Several of Nashua's parks, open spaces, and destinations border the lake. Cedar View Park (11) on the west side of the lake has a campground (10) with 43 campsites, which are fully occupied most of the summer by both visitors and local residents, as well as play equipment, two beaches, and a boat ramp (9). Cannon Park (17) is located on a bluff and offers excellent views of the lake. The site of the former highway bridge has been transformed into Veterans Park (22), a popular fishing spot. Cedar Lake Park (6) and Lakeshore Park (5) are north of Veterans Park on the east side of the lake. Lakeshore Park features an eight-tenths-mile trail (3) lined with wildflowers and providing another view of the lake. Just south of Lakeshore Park is another boat ramp (4).

In addition to Cedar Lake, Nashua has several hubs of activity or "hearts" of the community. Despite its small size, the **Dairy Treat** (16) is a major destination because of its proximity to the lake. The **welcome center** (12) hosts community events such as weddings and is accessible from the lake. Newer businesses such as **Dollar General** (13) and **Taylor Physical Therapy** (14) are located near the welcome center rather than on Main Street. Residents also use the **country club** (38) located on the **golf course** (37) for events.

Nashua is home of the Nashua-Plainfield School District (33), another popular venue for community activities. The elementary school (32) and the high school (30) are located on the Nashua campus, as well as the Husky Wellness Center (31), which is open to both students and residents.

Two popular tourist attractions are located just east of Nashua. The **Old Bradford Pioneer Village and Museum (25)** has 13 buildings. The **Little Brown Church (24)** is a popular wedding location for residents and visitors. The **fairgrounds (23)** also attract many visitors, hosting a four-county fair every year that

features events such as chuck-wagon races. The **school ball diamonds** (22) are just north of the fairgrounds.

Nashua residents rely on several landmarks to navigate the community. The water tower (15) is an excellent way-finding device, because it is highly visible, even from the Avenue of the Saints. The co-op (27) is used for way-finding on the east side of town, and the bus garage (35) is a navigation point on the south end. Locals often reference "The Diagonal" (29), or Waverly St, when providing directions. The Cedar River bridge (20) is another prominent landmark. The historic mill (18) and the dam and powerhouse (19) are just west of the bridge. The powerhouse continues to be a source of revenue for the community. Nashua's public library (28), a Carnegie library, has been serving the community since 1906.

With the exception of the **trailer park (34)** and **Schluter Addition**(36), the main residential developments are located near or on Cedar Lake. The **Lakeshore Drive neighborhood (8)** is situated along the eastern shore of the lake and provides access to Lakeshore Park. The area known as **Cedar Hill (7)** includes the streets that border Cedar Lake Park. Two developments—**Harbor Ridge and Millrock Heights**(1)—are north of Nashua and overlook the lake.
